And then she'd get through with it, and then she'd put leggin's in it, she'd put it on my feet and I'd wear those moccasins in the winter.

(How long did it take to make a pair of moccasins?)

Not too long. She could make a pair for me in a half a day. She don't put no bead work on these, they're just my every day shoes. The buckskin is sewed to the sole and then she'd sew those leggins up this way. They come about that high and I wears that for my everyday..and she's got some pretty ones she made for me that's what I wear when we go to town or anywhere, you know it's beaded, it's got fringes. It's like these grown up people's. You seen them when they dance. Like those, she makes them for me. She made me a little buckskin dress too when I was small. I just remember she made me a little buckskin dress and I had a shawl to go with it, and moccasins and a blanket. She makes all those things for me.

COMANCHE DRESSES:

(Is there any way you can tell a Comanche dress?)

The Comanches, they wear these..well, they hem it all the way around but they got a piece from here to here, right on this seam here, right over here like this and they sew it like that and it comes out like... That's what the old people used to wear but now-a-days we just have a straight skirt. But in the end it comes out like that in a little
