And it took them months til they got away from the Mexicans and finally they kept a going until they follow..every morning they would follow the sun and go on east. They know they're coming east and finally they come to a big hill like that. They come to the top of it they come to the top of it and when they look down there, toward the valley there was lots of camps in there, there them tipi's nothing but tipi's. And one of them said, "Them are Comanches. That's our folks." And they stop up there on top of the hill and I guess one of those mans he look up that way and he seen them. You know, when the Comanches are coming a long way the way they know it's a Comanche, they would stand their horse this way and they would tryst like this. They'd go around this way and stand this way again. And their horses they'd tryst them around like this. And their horses, they all tryst them around like this and they said, "They're Comanches. They make motion to us. They show us they're Comanches." And he hollered at them at camp, he said, "There's three men up there, and they made motion. They're Comanches." Everybody all at once they wanted to meet them. "We better get on our horses and meet them." And they got on their horses and line up that way, a bunch of them and then they got closer they were dressed in Spanish clothes and they come closer, closer, and
