

Yes, she could do anything like that, but if there's a group of mens right here in this room if she's like that she ain't supposed to come into the mens, walk here. She's got to stay back there. Especially in the peyote meeting now. It's still like that today. When a womans menstruating, or a girls menstruating, they ain't supposed to come into the peyote meetings, you know. She's going to stay away. That's the first thing that we ask the young girls that come here. "Are you menstruating or anything like that?" They say no and then they can go in. They're supposed to tell me you know, and the chief ask me to ask the girls anything like that because I don't know for what reason, but I know that's been coming on for long, many years. And they're not going to let anybody come to the peyote meeting when the men's eating medicines, and they ain't supposed to be around them or touch their dishes, or cooking or anything what they're going to eat. And still up to today, it's like that.

(Is there anything that's supposed to happen to a girl if she does go to a peyote meeting?)

When she's like that? I don't know but it's their rules that you ain't supposed to be like that when you're in the tipi or in that place where these mens have medicine eating medicine. They're not supposed to be near them. That's what they tell me.

MOVEMENT OF COMANCHES:

(Do you know any stories about Mt. Scott or any of the other mountains out here?)

Well, the Wichitas used to be up in these mountains and that's why they call them the Wichitas. They used to be all up here, but then some of them got killed and some of them left. I think some of them left
