

a tipi. They live there all that spring. They said we live there all through that winter and that spring and when I was born we came on home. My grandfather live over here by Mt. Scot then. From there...we stayed there for a long time until my father and mother build us a...just a little two room house. And then from there we came...moved back here across the creek. And ever since I come to know a little bit better...I we went to school and come back, that's were we live, All those years, and the then my father and mother got old and that's when I got married. When I was little I know that's were we used to live. Ever since I could remember. We live there all the time.

(Why were you camping at Ft. Sill?)

That's because all the Indians used to just camp around there... that creek, all the time. That's were we stayed. Sometimes when we still there, they have payments and they give us payments. The government pay us and all the childrens and the father and mothers they get paid. Everybody gets payment. Sometimes they have to wait two or three weeks before they get their payment that's the way the Indians. That's why we were camping there. I was born in May and as soon as everybody would get their payment they would just leave back home. Just get on their wagons and move. And that's were we was waiting for the payment and that's where I was born, right there waiting for the payment and that's where. When I was born there I got my first payment with them. I was a baby must have been about three or four days old when our time and I got a payment. That's what my dad said.
