Yeah, that's what I get shawls and blankets and goods and anything they would give me. Give me that. Sometimes when they ain't got too much money they just give me only goods. Sometimes they give me groceries for what they going to give me.

(Can you pass this on to some of your children?)

I don't know if they want it, but I never did ask my daughter if she could use it...take it. I'm going to ask her some of these days and tell her if she wants it I could pass it on to her because she got some childrens and they might be some childrens that she could help or anybody like that but I don't know...she lives too much like the white peoples. She don't care for it. That's what I think.

(Where do you store your medicine?)

I got them here in the house. They don't have to be in the cooler. Everthings dry. You have to dry all those medicines. I just dry them up and sack them up and get them ready for anybody that wants to be doctored. Sometimes somebody call...drive up, and I doctor you.

(Do the Comanche have any sacred objects that the old people had that they just keep around because they are sacred?)

Yes.

(What do they have?)

Oh, they just...if you doctor anybody, you know...any girl menstrating ain't supposed to go where that woman is doctoring, they ain't supposed to be near them. When you eating at a table they ain't supposed to
