

District and had a one room school house out there and I went to school out there two years I believe, then I came to town. It was a nice school there two years I believe, then I came to town. It was a nice school in fact it was the first modle school they had in the county. I believe it was built out of raw hide lumber or cotton wood lumber, but it was then they pretty sturdy old school house and it stayed there until 1920 then they tore it down and built a new one. And I think they kept it until 1934 and then it was annexed to Carnegie and the new school house was tore down. But anyway I finished the 7th grade and 8th grade out there then started to Carnegie. I left here and went to Cilycotton, Missouri. The Alan--Business College. Took a couple of--I learnt that worked at Sante Fe Railroad in 1917--or I would have been drafted out of there I got in the Signal Corps.

INDIANS AND EDUCATION:

(When you where in school over here were there any Indians?)

No, we didn't have no Indians there. There weren't any Indians at all.

(How come, were they not allowed or did they not want to come?)

They were allowed. There weren't none living out north of town then. Lived in town a lot of them. I guess none of them went to school herel. You know, them days why they didn't kater on school and all. They wouldn't go to school unless they had to and the town wasn't going to make them go. So that's one reason why the Indians Department destributed--they're more strick about them then they are the whites. But they had to go to school in them days. I seen an old boy that was about 25 or 30 years old and he couldn't write his name at all. I fixed him up, sure they are. Bensusse they, wrong they need to start to school they have very intelligent students of the Indians.

INDIANS ATTITUDES:

(What do you think about them leasing their land to the white people?)

I tell you one thing about the Indians, he don't work if any of them. The percen-
