

(Now when you became 21, you told me you first started receiving quarterly payments -)

Yeah, when I was 21, well, all payment I got was \$100.00. And my wife got \$100.00. - That was in 1912.

(When were you were married?)

In 1912 - - June the 29th, I believe I was married - - 1912.

(About two, nearly three months after you were 21. Then you mentioned earlier too, about orders, government orders that permitted you to buy groceries at the store here in Pawhuska.)

Well, that was before I got any payment - The - our parents the ones that got the \$40.00 order - that - ah - that was before the allotment in 1906.

And ah - that was time when the government gave grocery - or the City - or - what ever business it was that they needed. Was mostly groceries - I think they got - \$40 dollars on - \$40 dollars a quarter.

(Credit?)

Yeah. Credit. They had cards and they marked down just how much they got.

(Then \$40.00 a quarter, then was all the Osages were receiving. Which would be \$160 a year. And later, after you became 21 - payments then became a \$100 a quarter or \$400.00 a year. Do you recall when they became more than a \$100 a quarter?)

Yes. Later on we got pretty good size payments then. So it helped us to - in our ways of living, changed the ways of living, made improvements, and ah - was very much helpful to the tribe. I'm sure they have seen the changes of those days because of the money they were getting at that time.

(Well now, you must of been in your thirties - long somewhere in 1920.

When - ah - big oil production really occurred here in Osage county,

What was your feeling then Mr. Iron, when you knew that each headright
