But in my sister's wedding - my grandfather - whose Indian name was (Osage name), and his English name was Henry Red Eagle. He bought a Studebaker. I could just see the car. It was kinda odd looking - as I think of - it now, but it was a Studebaker car. He bought that for my sister to ride in. So we didn't ride in the hack, pulled with the horses, we rode in this car. And my - we had a driver - I can't remember who drove. But it ah - my aunt Mrs. Julia Lookout, who was the wife of Chief Lookout, who was our chief for many years. When he died he was still our chief. Well his wife was my aunt and she was the bridesmaid of honor - So she was the first cousin to my father, so he called her sister. So that made her - become the bridesmaid of honor - and she rode in the front seat with the driver, and my sister and I rode in the back. And ah - and the brides - ah -
