No. These were concrete or brick buildings. They were banks- was brick buildings.

(What about the hotel?)

there was threy six of 'em on that one street. And reached half mile up to the depot. Today, as far as I know, - I was down there about six or seven years ago-came through that way - and there was a Killing station guy that keeps a little beads and stuff like that, fish bait things, little bit of groceries and there wasn't even a grocery store thate. So, two filling stations, and here and there a little old field shack.

(Well, what did you all do down there? Did you run another boarding house?)

No. a -we, a- my brother kept us up see. And my mother just worked, you know,

She'd sew for people, and - or go stay with people that was sick or somethin!.

Most of the time we lived with my grandma. See. Worked on my grandma's farm.

But we'd go back down there to go to school, 'cause we'didn't have to buy

our books down there. We had to buy them in Oklahoma. See, Texas had free

books since 1916, and we didn't have to buy them. Did you say there was a

lot of Indians that made money in these oil fields?).

There was here, some of 'em. But the way they made it, they made it out of

There was here, some of 'em. But the way they made it, they made it out of the land heep had. Now the Indians that had an education - that had the opportunity to, you know, they was lucky enough they went to school - - now they did make it big. Now take that man I mentioned here or other - - I didn't know id he died or if somethin' happened to him - named Kitchens. Now they did good, and they a- oh, Frank Big Doctor and Little Doctor - their
