And we lived there at Dio Mission and then when I got school age we moved to Yellow Mission. That's where we had that tent, you know, I was telling - you about. With that wind break around it. (What did you live in before you lived in the tent?) At Dio Mission.
(Where did you live there?)
In a house. We used to go visit my aunt over there at. Fipexen. 'That's where I was born-Flaxson. I was/born behind a garage. Right on the corner of, Faxson.
(What year?)
1913. And we'd go visịt her once in a while and then we'd go visit--he's my 'nephew, I guess, you know him, Robert Cofey, we used to go visit them. We visit with them and we'd go/ to Holiday, you know that was a store close. fye'd"buy sardine cans and when we go back home we'd make them into little buggies, you know. When we playing with rag dolls under the plum bushes, we'd draig out--that was Roxy. She was my friend. I play with her under them plum bushes and we go out over the field you know, and pick'up these terrapins, and they'd eat them. And I'd stand behind the chicken house and watch 'them eat. I wouldn't eat"it. And then her brother would go down, to the pond after frogs, they had green' frogs, I wouldn't eat them then but later -I got to eating them and they're good.
(When they cooked those turtles in the fire; did they put anything on them?)
No; nothing. Just put them in the fìre like that and when they puil their $\ddot{r}$ legs off and start eating on them. I couldn't get that. I never did eat turtle'. To this 'day I. don't eat turtle. But my daughter likes it: I don't know where she got it--Holiday was our good old towh. It was just one store. You know a merchandize store. Merchandise and it had everythrigeyou could want in it. When we go there we turn south, used to be our old homéplace.
