We go fishing, I mean we go hunting for frogs. My son-in-law goes out there and hunts for frogs. He killed eighteen this last time. Great big frogs. The size of rabbits, you know. In New York they didn't believe him that they was that big but they took twelve home and they seen them. Big as rabbits. And I don't know. When my grandmother was younger, they live out there, but I never did live out there at Flaxson on our home place.

(When did you first get married?)

In 1931.

(Who did you marry?)

Charlie, see I was living with this guy, first time, and oh, I tell you he just beat me up. Over nothing. One day we were at the camp meeting over there at—oh, I don't want to telk you about my life story. Anyway, he died. This guy died and so after I married Charlie, this other guy died. Find another weman and he had a lot of boys. LAnd Charlie and I has been living together about—lets see—since 31. Thirty-six years isn't it? (When May Walqua was talking the other day about the brothers giving the sisters away, was that done when you were young?)

No. You get the man of your choice. What ever you want for your husband. (Say why don't I ask you something about words?)
