BACKGROUND OF INFORMANT:

His mother's father was Old Man Pallie, a Spanish boy captured by the Comanches and later traded to the Kiowas. His mother's mother was Kiowa, and she told him the stories he relates in these interviews. Charles attended the St. Ratrick's Mission School just west of Anadarko.
