

Mr. D.:

Let me ask you a few things, I understand this is what it is. You seem to be saying the decision is up to be made solely by the Welfare Department. Because I understand that; and that that role in the matter of the Bureau of Indian Affairs is sufficient.

Mr. D.:

I would say the Bureau is the agency that Mr. O'Field has to go through to his land, is the one I understand and fit, and I have to know that as far as that agency to comply with our policy and their role is to inform us as to what action he has done & then to take.

Mr. T.:

So it isn't an advisory situation whether or not he can sell what you call resources depends on the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Mr. D.:

It's my understanding the Bureau has appraised evaluation on this property and will protect his rights and had they not thought this was proper amount of money it they would ask us to hold it and continue him on a hardship basis.

Mr. D.:

They make the decision, the Bureau does?

Mr. D.:

Which decision?

Mr. D.:

Whether or not to sell the land at the price?

Mr. D.:

I guess, probably Mr. & Mrs. Mr. O'Field made the decision this time.

Mr. D.:

Well, you know, that is a matter of fact; that I'm trying to do now is to find out what you all think is proper here, that is who make the decision. If I'm trying to find out is whether you think would be want to contact him or your position on that, who make the decision or that the Bureau of Indian Affairs make the decision, you seem to be telling me first that you make the decision and you seem to be telling me that the Bureau makes the decision, that's what I'm trying to find out now so we can, you know, settle on an issue here so we can get facts to.

Mr. D.:

Well, whenever he received this bid, the Bureau considered fair, to a point I stand it, that; and he refuses to take this, he has taken action and taken in excess of his reserve; our policy says that this case will be closed, no further action, I would say he took some action, the Bureau might of taken no action and we took some action. You might say any individual agency can take action or any individual person.

Mr. D.:

I think one of the difficulties we're having Mr. Powers, is that Mr. Powers is in adversary proceedings and I don't think Mr. Danley is in opposition to him. I'm trying to find out if who is being opposed here, is the Department of Justice or the Bureau of Indian Affairs and what I want is some answers.

Mr. D.:

As I understand then, your interested in identifying what agency was responsible for closing Mr. O'Field's case, is that correct?

Mr. D.:

I still say our Department was responsible for closing his case.

Mr. D.:

But did you do it only after its consideration and its decision is made by the Bureau of Indian Affairs? You said they considered whether or not the bid was right and that decision is apparently theirs.

Mr. D.:

They considered that the bid was above I assume their appraisal value, we know what their appraisal is and they said it was an overbid and he turned down. I know we're going round and round.
