

Mr. T.: And you felt you were unable to make by yourself in talking with Mr. O'Field, you talked to your supervisor about it first?

Mrs. E.: Yes.

Referee: They are both representatives of the County Department and acting on behalf of the department.

Mr. T.: I suppose you could, I'm not going to assume either way. Now, at that point, on the 27th, what was your understanding of the procedure insofar as Mr. O'Field's resources, that would occur, your understanding that would occur should that on the 13th, 14th, of May had been accepted by Mr. O'Field, what do you think would have happened if he'd said, yes, I accept that \$6400?

Mrs. E.: That would automatically terminate his case.

Mr. T.: No, I'm talking about what would have happened to Mr. O'Field and his resources if he'd met that sale and the man held out \$6400 and said yes I want to buy that land and Mr. O'Field said yes, I want to sell it, I want to know from you what you think would have happened next?

Mr. T.: Effecting us or effecting Mr. O'Field?

Mr. T.: Mr. O'Field and his resources.

Mrs. E.: I hadn't given that any consideration, that wouldn't be up to me to decide what he would do with it.

Mr. T.: That is as much as I have to ask on that sentence and I think probably this is a good point to conclude for the day.

Referee: The hearing on the case of Joe O'Field is resumed at this time and Mr. Trapp will you continue with the question.

Mr. T.: Mrs. Evinger, your on the 1st paragraph on the second page, that is the first paragraph on the second page, there is one line and I will read it; Mr. O'Field feels his land is worth much more than was offered and he plans to sell the land but does not want to do so for value he feels is not correct. Is that statement from one of the papers in your records that you read yesterday?

Mrs. E.: I believe it is there, the only part that there is about the price.

Mr. T.: Can you read that to us again what he said about the price; what your records say that Mr. O'Field said about the price?

Referee: Identify there Mrs. Evinger what your reading as well as the date.

Mrs. E.: This is taken from Joe O'Field's C case page 45 from the narrative the date is May 26, 1969, this is talking about Mr. O'Field, he said he did not accept the offer as he did not feel the price was enough.

Mr. T.: Does it say on there that he said he felt the land is worth much more than was offered, is there something there about that?

Mrs. E.: On 6-24-69 of the same page, Mr. O'Field declined this offer stating that he felt the property was worth twice that amount.

Mr. T.: Do you know as a result of your visits to Mr. O'Field's property how many people live on or use that land?
