Mr. T.: Why did she offer her land up for sale?

Mrs. P.: She thought that she had to sell it. She said that she thought they would give her the money when it was sold. She said for a long time they wouldn't give her

Mr. T.: Miss Proctor, do you receive public assistance from the Delaware County Department now?

Mrs. P.: Now she does.

Mr. T.: Did you get public assistance before you sold your land?

Mrs. P.: No. She said that the money she had after she sold the land had to be used before she could get assistance from the Welfare Department and they said it be used up by the time she reached 60 or what ever age it is when they get assistance.

Mr. T.: Who said that?

Mrs. P.: She said it was a Bureau Representative from the Land Agency.

Mr. T.: What was this sale?

Mrs. P.: She said she couldn't remember when it was but she said it had been quite a while. She said she was only getting \$75 a month and the Bureau of Indian Affairs was using her own money.

Mr. T.: What money's that?

Mrs. P.: From the sale of that land.

Mr. T.: How much money did the sale bring?

Mrs. P.: \$7,500.

Mr. T.: And she got \$75 a month? ... When was the last \$75 you got?

Mrs. P.: She doesn't remember but she signed the papers, but she doesn't have them now but she didn't start getting assistance from the Welfare Department until 1960.

Mr. T.: In 1960 she started receiving welfare?

Mrs. P.: Yes.

Mr. T.: For the record, 75 goes into 5500; for the record \$75 a month goes into \$5500, looks like about 75 times, about 6 years, isn't it? It looks like the sale would have been around 1900 or 1950.
