

Mrs. P.: He said he was receiving Old Age Assistance at the time he had the money.

Mr. T.: Was he getting any kind of Welfare before he sold that 60 acres?

Mrs. P.: Yes.

Mr. T.: How much was he getting?

Mrs. P.: He said he was getting about \$25 as far as he could remember from the Welfare Department before he sold the land.

Mr. T.: \$25 a month?

Mrs. P.: Yes.

Mr. T.: And then after he sold the land and got that \$360, or after it was sold and it was that much, did he continue to get \$25 a month?

Mrs. P.: They said he'd get \$100 sometimes from Welfare Department.

Mr. T.: \$100 a month?

Mrs. P.: Um hum.

Mr. T.: After he sold his land?

Mrs. P.: It was after he sold his land.

Mr. T.: Let's be sure about this, as I understand, you were getting \$25 a month before your land was sold from Welfare and \$100 a month from Welfare after your land was sold.

Mrs. P.: He said yeah.

Mr. T.: Do you have the 45 acres that was left out of your 105 now?

Mrs. P.: The Bureau of Indian Affairs said it would be better if he sold the 45 acres that was left too.

Mr. T.: In what way would it be better?

Mrs. P.: He said the Bureau told them that they had two tracts of land and that it was too much, they had too much land yet. But the other land belonged to his wife, so he had to sell the 40 acres, the 45 acres.

Mr. T.: The Bureau said that you had to sell the 45 acres because your wife had tax on the land?

Mrs. P.: Yes.

Mr. T.: Who was it from the Bureau that told you that?

Mrs. P.: He said it was Johnny Walker.

Mr. T.: Was there anyone else who helped you in that way Mr. Bird?

Mrs. P.: He said that Johnny Walker and the Social Worker from the Bureau of Indian Affairs at Tahlequah, Rudolph Jenkins came out when he sold the last 45 acres.
