Sometime they travel foot from way up there, Blackfoot, Blackfoot Mountain, way back north around Washington, Montana, Wyoming; way back went in them big mountains. So that's where the Kiowa, Kiowa-Apache were originally together, way back there, for centuries and centuries. (Static) Then they went down to Oklahoma, right here where we original, right here. My grandmother died down here in (word not clear). She was a hundred and five - a hundred and six years old.

(What was her name?)

CHARLES: Hotigh, Hotigh (Name spelled phonetically)

MARY: Cecelia. (Speaks Kiowa)

CHARLES: Cecelia is her English name. She's a captive. Grandmother captive, Spanish. She's not no Mexican, she's Spanish. She just light, just light as you are. White as any white man, white woman. She was born white.

CHARLES: She was uh -, the Indians captured her from Chihuahua. Way back in Spanish settlement, Chihuahua. See, they had a Spanish settlement over there. And they had several kinds of Indians in that country. Different kind of tribe. And that's where the Kiowas captured my grandma. And they raised her when she was about, oh, they captured her, she was going to school. And she was the youngest. And the next to her, they captured
