BACKGROUND OF INFORMANT:

Mrs. E. F. Kelley was born in October 1900, just north of the Red River. Her father was Jim Dixon who was a friend and neighbor to the Indians. He helped them learn to do many things and also made plow shares for them. They in turn, taught him many plants and herbs used for food and medicine and he taught his daughter Mrs. Kelley. Mrs. Kelley has lived in many places--Texas, Oregon, New Jersey and several towns in Oklahoma. She learned to distill perfume from her grandmother, using rose petals. Mrs. Kelley moved to Norman in 1930 and has lived here since that time.
