Captain Locke was down there and Doc and Victor Locke, all down there. His wife, all of them down there--in Camp Howe. (?)

(You got twenty-seven dollars?)

Huh?

(You got twenty-seven dollars to come home on?)

Twenty-seven dollars to ride home.

(To ride home when you were discharged?)

(not clear) --eighty dollars a month.

(Eighty dollars a month?)

Eighty dollars a month.

(Eight dollars a month.)

Eighty dollars.

(Eight dollars a month you got.)

I paid seven dollars on that--no fifteen on that. Fifteen dollars on my account. I paid fifteen dollars--seven dollars insurance. I didn't have much left.
