

After we come here, they send me out to hospital--examine, you know. They didn't find no T.B. on me. Send me back around there. Finally, they got me and they pay me thirty dollars a month... No, thirty-three dollars a month, start.

(That was a World War I pension wasn't it?)

I draw it. And then Doctor (not clear)-- seventy, seventy-eight dollars a month and 75 cents a month--that's six month. And a hundred now.

(A hundred dollars. You get a hundred dollars a month now--pension?)

Now.

(From World War I?)

Yes Mom!

(Now this is not the same as your Social Security?)

Social Security didn't prove it: Right lately, I said, "Pay insurance for hospital, while age." I pay--he pays all that. Whatever Veteran's hospital I can get in I give him Security number. Go in there and sign it.

(But your Social--)

Hundred dollars a month.

(But that's not the same--?)

I haven't got it yet. I'll get it though, I guess.

(Well, what I'm trying to find out, your Social Security is not the same as your pension for World War I.)

No. No you right. They was gonna give me hundred--done paid that. I can get in there, any time.

(Have you been to the Veteran's hospital in Sulphur?)

I got insurance where my daddy's got that--his home. And new law--some kind, they got all of that. She got up there.

(Your daughter at Talihina?)
