move there you'll never be in want, the government will take care of you as long as you live." Now that was their understanding as it has been handed down.

(Still is isn't it?)

Still is--

(They wanted that --)

They wanted that, yes.

EDUCATION IS CHANGING ATTITUDES AMONG THE YOUNG PEOPLE

(Do you think that attitude still prevails in a lot of people in this part of the state?)

A lot of people, just a lot, yes. I tell you the older people fight now has that right now--that's the reason you see, well we don't want the government to have a tight grip on us, right now, let the government loosen it's grip just a little at a time. Not all the way, cause we don't want to be, we still want to be under the supervision of the government yet...That's not the attitude of the older people, but the younger ones, the--are getting more educated and mixing with the whites more, so--are changing away from that. So, I don't believe in too long a time, these old customs they have right now, will go away from us. Now you take a youngster say from ten or twelve year old, they can't understand Cherokee anymore. It's something, they don't even talk it. They don't know, it no. Seems like they're ashamed to talk it. That's just the way things are gonna be to me.
