Now those are the kind of people to me, especially preachers, if they understand human relations, why isn't that religion?

A NEED FOR LEADERSHIP IN THE EDUCATION PROGRAM

(One other thing Calvin, and I think I'll stop, we were talking about the leadership, now, do you think there can be developed leadership among the different communities or among the different clans or societies of the tribe, that can form a new council?)

That's right, I wish something like that would happen.

(You think there's leadership there that could be developed?)

Yes. Yes, I do.

(And do you think the Cherokee people as a whole would respond to that type of leadership?)

I would, that would be something to find out, but I do think it would be one certain way to get those people united--

(It's been a long time hasn't it?)

Been a long--that's right.
