Kinda like tnat vetcn or peas they raise for cattle; something on that order. Now we gatner that and gather wild beets and gather - I don't know whether sweet potato or Irisn potato, anyway; it was wild potatoes that we used to gather. ( those bufealo beans - have you'ever heard it called anything like Levil's Slaw?) No. Now there used to be what we used to call milk weed that if you remember back in World War II, we gathered that by the tons down in Texas. It's silk. "Looks like this - oh, what you call this polyester stufi that's (Yes, Unhunnh)

Real silky like. It is wonderful to make pillows and things.out of. And you can make real good life preservers out of it. (Oh, for goodness sake.)

Well t'at's what they. gathered it for see. In fact, they talked about puttif' it in the ships but they just simply couldn't get enough. Now it's a milk. Feed. I don't know the botany name for that, either. Now tnat's - when that mi pod busted, oh, boy, that thing would get on you - Man Itye got 'em of mepore
