Well, they wouldn't want to sell me that house. That's discrimination here. Well, we were going to buy over there, but we run into this one. There's just two of us. And down here where we used to live is a big old by-pass, coming right through our place--right near the house. So we had to move away from there.

(Was that the place you were talking about?)

Ed: We had to move away from there and we run into this thing. And you'd be surprised how much we got it for? Yes, we own this house. We got it for eighty-seven hundred.
