No. See, my brother got married and he married a girl who was the only child in the family. And there were just two of us--my brother and I. My brother was ten years older than me. So when he got married my mother hated to see him leave home. So she went and gave him this--she said she was going to give him this 160. And then at the same time this girl's folks went and built her a two-story brick home south of Thomas. They wanted her to stay there. So they decided to just go back and forth. When he came to plow his land he'd stay here, and then go back to their brick home. And it didn't turn out the way they wanted it--it got hurt in an accident--(and died, young).
