(What was your mother's name?)

Her name was Mary Pallie at that time. But later well then--

(Lincoln: what was her Indian name?)

Tsedo. Later on, my father went to school at Carlisle. He was Kiowa-Apache. He married my mother. And there was two of us--my older brother, Logan Tartsoh, and my name is Charles Tartsoh.

(Then your father was Kiowa-Apache?)

My father was Kiowa-Apache.

(What was his name?)

His name was Logan Tartsoh. That was my father's name.

(Lincoln: Logan Tartsoh, Sr.)

Then my brother was named after my father--Logan Tartsoh, Jr.

(This is the one older than you are? Is he living?)

He is dead. Logan Tartsoh Sr. went to Carlisle Institute. When he finished school there then he came home and became disciplinary director of the Kiowa school.--the first school that was built.

(Where was that?)

(Lincoln: It was right on the east bank of the Washita River--right where Anadarko is presently located.)

(Well, if your father is Apache, are you enrolled as a Kiowa or--)

Kiowa-Apache. My father is half Kiowa and Half Apache. Kiowa-Apache,

(So you're enrolled, yourself, as a Kiowa-Apache?)

That's right.

(What are you then, Lincoln?)

(Lincoln: Kiowa. See, nearly all of us--just the older brother is the only one that's registered as Kiowa-Apache. But all the rest of us are registered Kiowas.)
