This is prairie dog song. (Sings Kiowa song) You know what tago means? (Sings song)

(That's pretty. Could you tell me what the words mean?)

I can't tell it. I can't say. I can't. I don't know what it means. He said, "By the mountain there's a prairie dog lives there. Lot's of prairie dogs live by the mountain." That's what the words mean. No one but one-maybe it's that little one that went in the hole. Maybe that's her song. Everyone was gone but one little one, it says, in the song words. "I don't know where the rest of them go but one," it says. "And he's got some kind of teeth beads he's got on." Beads and it's some kind of teeth, around his neck. I think it's bear teeth, they said. Now he's sitting there singing with a whistle. What you call--chu-chu-chu-chu-whistle. He sang with that, too.

(When do the children sing these songs?)

They--that's just a play song they sing at night when they tell the story.

They sing play songs--by these songs. Moses know every song.

(You mean if you're telling these stories to your grandchildren, they might sing too?)

Everybody knows these songs. But this time I guess they don't tell no story like that. Because everyone that's young now, they got no old folks now. And I guess they don't tell them stories—old-back stories. And they don't know it now. I tell mine, but they don't care. They don't care for old stories. They just like to look on their way what they studying.
