And they say--I know of two or three different cases where--just foolishness--some guy was going somewhere and there were one or two of the boys--and--. You have to hold those rituals very sacredly, you know. They're sacred. You have to kind of respect them. Anyhow, they started on the lope and this man start singing this "horse song." Pretty soon his horse stumbled and fell down and he broke his collar bone. And this fellow said, "Now, you oughten't to sing this horse song." "Well," he said, "I was just singing it because I heard it." Well, they told him he ought to go to the right place to sing it--not just running around--roughing around like this.
