and they pay him so much of his debt, and he may owe two or three there and want to divide his money with them. One fellow would get it all. The Indian would endorse it and he'd keep it. And don't give them his money back, because he may owe all his check or more. And he want so much and sometimes these Indians come and report it to the agent.

(End of side A)

SIDE B

(Now, if I can remember what we were talking about--let's see, you just told me that it was against the law to garnishee a government check?)

Yeah. And those Indians know it. The Agents told them. But if they want to voluntarily pay them, it's all right, they can go ahead and pay them. But they can't force it away from you.

(I see.)

INDIANS HIRED TO COLLECT MONEY

They can't force it. And if there's any forcing done reported to the United States Marshal or come back to him reported. And a lot of them do come back. And all those bankers and merchants, they all know about it. I wasn't the only one working for them. There was different men hired to help collect money—Indians. And they was helping out. Well, George told a friend of his, and he was in the hardware business and he hired me too. Miller Hardware Company. Miller, he just give me \$1000 or \$1500 cash in a bag and he'd give me his list of creditors and just go ahead and take their checks. And I just carried Miller's money. I don't have to take them to Miller. I just catch them over there
