good for fever and different things, sickness. An old Kiowa lady, her name's On-Kima, lives at Verden, she's one of the oldest ones, she was a peyote woman too. All those that I know. Another old man at Rainy Mountain, his name was Chainey, old man Chainey. He's one of the oldest peyote men. And my fathe and Sankidoti, they were the oldest. (And what was this woman's name in Verden?)

/ On-Kima.

(What is her first name?)

Oh, it's kind of funny. It's just an Indian name you know, she was married to--the one they reburied from Verden to Ft. Sill was my great uncle.

(Is she still living?)

No, she died long time. And me and my cousin, Lucy Jackson was her name before she got married, Lucy Bouton she lives at Verden, and we put in a story, and a lady you know, she's a Milinery from Gallup, New Mexico-California, somewhere. She made a book of it and Scott's got the book.

OLD BOOK ABOUT PEYOTE MEDICINE

(What kind of book?)

It's a big book and it got picture of art picture. It's got, and wrote story about the peyote medicine and it's got our name on there and we wrote that story. Milinery had it fixed for us had it printed. Find my grandpa got that medicine you know, he doctors, that ring, that silver he's got came from Old Mexico. When the Kiowas went to Mexico, all the chief, were over there and they—Mexican chief came and give them silver and that silver was in a medicine bundle, you know, them bundles the Indians got, Kiowas, there are ten of them. Call them Ten Grandmothers but they're medicine bundle. And this medicine bundle that one of his kinfolks had, you know, and there was—and that silver was inside, and
