VISITING THE SHOSHONE:

(What is the Indian word for that?)

U-are-eye. In Indian that means warm spot. That's what they call  
it. Now, and up to today I hear them Shoshones, when we were down there,  
they said they came to a place where we was staying up there when we  
went to Wyoming, I and Joey, they invited us to their meeting and Joey  
said, "Where is the meeting?" They said, "Just go up the hill a little  
ways away, and go north to that U are eye. That's what he said. And I  
look at Joey and I said, "That's what the Comanches call it a long time  
ago." And still up to today its got that same name. Because they're  
the ones that went ther and they settled up there and up till now they  
still live up there. When my grandmother was telling me I was about  
14 years old, she said, "Sometimes when you get older, you go visit those  
Comanches. You go down there because there's agoing to be trains going  
down there. Sometimes when you get old enough to understand everything  
you go down there and visit those Comanches. They are--we are descents  
of them that came this way. There's a lot of them staying up there.  
There's a bunch of them over there. That's where I come from." That's  
what she said.

(So the Shoshones were Comanches?)

They were Comanches.
