In Indian that what I heard way back in years and now the other day I heard it again." He said, "Yeah, this is a warm spot because this place right in here don't get cold like the outside." You know its got--oh, they got some kind of willow or brushes just thick around the river. You can hardly go down to the river. Its just--some of them got stickers on they just thick all around the river and its got some kind of willows around like that and its open this way toward the side its open and its just thick and they live right in there. That's where the Comanches used to be--long time when they left from here. And that spot they call warm spot. During the winter when they was living in that spot.
