

He said he heard that, now up to today, lot of this kids, you know, they don't have nothin' like that. And I go visit him (her son) some Saturdays when he's not doing nothing, he catch all my stories. He even catch me praying too. He told me to pray in my language--pray in Indian way and he caught all that and sing some church songs for him and he caught all of that.

(This is that Shohone man?)

No, my boy here.

(You said you went to a meeting. (Peyote) up there. Do they have their meetings any different then you all do?)

No, the same way. You know, long time, way back in years, bunch of Comanches they went to visit them--they went on train you know. They went down there because they wasn't no cars then. They went. They show them how to. They ask them, "Do you use this one?" They said, "No we don't know nothing about it." So the Comanches learn them. Long time, Comanches used to go on train and get that peyote. Up Texas. Now they have cars, get on down there in a little while.

(Where does that medicine grow that you use for asthma?)

I saw it--it's--I saw a lot of it up here on that Y. (Apache Y) West there. A little hill just covered with it. That's where I seen lot of it, and I seen some over here at Fletcher, Oklahoma. East of Fletcher, up there on the hill--north--just a little ways up there. Seen it all over.

(Where does the medicine grow that you doctor people who have fits?)

Oh, lets see--oh, way down in Frederick and south--its about 8 or 9 miles from Frederick. It might not be that far. It's not too far to the river from Frederick that way. That's where we got it. I never
