And this boy used to be married to an Arapaho girl at Clinton. Emil Curtis is his name. Ed Burns knows him. Sometimes you ought to check with him. Ed Burns could get Emil to come over there and bring that thing over. Some Arapaho made. There used to be three or four of them, but that's the only one I know of now. Yeah.
