MRS. WHITEDAY: "YES. LUCY MARKHAM AND I WENT TO SCHOOL TOGETHER  
BEFORE 1900, AND SHE LIVES AT LOCUST GROVE. I  
DONT KNOW OF ANY OTHERS CLOSE BY."

INTERVIEWER: "WHAT BECAME OF THE CHILDREN WHEN THE ORPHANS  
HOME BURNED IN 1903?"

MRS. WHITEDAYS: "THE CHILDREN WERE TAKEN TO WHITAKER HOME IN  
PRYOR CREEK. THEY WERE TAKEN OVER IN WAGONS.  
SOME OF THE BOYS HAD NEVER KNOWN ANY OTHER  
PLACE BUT SALINA, AND THE WHITAKER HOME WAS  
TOO MUCH OF A CHANGE AND TOO STRANGE FOR THEM.  
NINE OR TEN OF THE BOYS IMMEDIATELY CAME BACK  
TO SALINA. WALKED ALL THE WAY AND SWAM THE RIVER.  
THEY WENT TO LIVE WITH DIFFERENT INDIAN FAMILIES  
AROUND SALINA."

(MRS. WHITEDAY SHOWED ME A NEWSPAPER CLIPPING  
FROM A NEWSPAPER (UNKNOWN) DEALING WITH THE  
CHEROKEE ORPHANS HOME, AND WHICH HAD A PICTURE  
OF THE BUILDING.)
