They fidn't have no silver way tack like the, do now, like this sterling and derman silver work. They even use spoons-flatten silver spoons to make birds and things like that.

(Oh, they did. Well, did you tell me about how the Kiowas learned how to do the silver work?)

I don't know where the, jot it, but the, been doing that kind of work a lon't time.

(They have?)

Just like those people up there--maybe that's where they got it--from these different tribes. You know they're wearing a lot of silver and it's been taken way back.
