(Oh, they did. Well, did you tell me about how the Kiowas learned how to do the silver work?)

I don't know where they got it, but they been doing that kind of work a long time.

Just like those people up there--maybe that's where they got it--from these different tribes. You know they're wearing a lot of silver and it's been taken way back.
