(It does!)

Yeah. That's what it is. I don't know, maybe that biCrd got something to do with that peyote. That's why they got all them fans in there--and all kinds of pretty looking fans you know. Eagles, and scissor-tails. Water birds. Different kind of birds.

(Well, you know, you said something about this water bird being a bird from Florida.. Well, how would the Kiowas have learned about that?)

Well, they get them tail feathers from back south. I don't know where. They come from there somewherees.

(What do they look like?)

I think there's some around here now--these big lakes. They look like cranes.
