(Ah, leaf of a tree?)

(How many men were on the firing squad?)

Two Course the whole council, I guess, you know, anybody that wanted to see could go there.

(Now these men who, who fired the rifles, were they Lighthorsemen?)
Lighthorsemen is right.

(Do you remember much--the other two executions, now, were, were identical with these, were they?)

Yes sir.

(Do you remember the last execution in the Seminole nation?)

Quibby?

(I, I don't know the name, but do, do you remember when the last one occurred and who it was?)

The last two? You mean the last folks they whipped?

(No, well the last folks they whipped and the last person to be executed.)

Oh, oh yes, that was, ah, Lisha Brown, the man I was telling you about. He was the last one they killed there.

(Was he the last one that was killed under the Seminole law?)

Under the Seminole law, yes sir.

(What about whippings? Now, they were later moved into Wewoka weren't they?)
Who that?

(The people who were whipped, after they built the council house. Didn't they whip them--they had a whipping tree

(Oh yes.
