(He was older than Jackson and John Brown?)

Oh yeah, oh yeah.

(Who were some of the other adopted tribal members who were white?)

Old man Alex Crain--and, ah, I think old man Sam Davis--that was Alice Davis and them's father.

(uh huh.)

I think his name was Sam Davis.

(It wouldn't be George Davis?)

Maybe, maybe.

(He was Alice Brown's husband?)

Yes suh, dat's it--dat's de man, dat's de man.

(Now, didn't they have a store out around Arbeka?)

Yes suh, back out dere.

(Do you know much of what was going on in the Creek Nation, while you were living in the Seminole Nation?)

Well, no suh. I didn't know too much about that.

(You don't know too many Creeks, although your father was a Creek freedman?)
