

Howard: I don't know.

Ray: They're bound to have. It's just like any other Apache--they name him in their own way. But the Comanches, they named the Apaches a certain way the way they see it.

(What about this "White Horn"? (Til-la-ka) . . . .

Ray: di/ikʷa -di- means "horn".

(Have you ever heard of anybody with that name?)

Howard: I never did.

Ray: That's way beyond my time. I just heard.

(This other fellow that you mention--Peso--where did he come from?)

Howard: He's a Kiowa-Apache.

Ray: The word, Pacer, you know how horses pace? I think he got that kind of walk--that's why they call him that *vádaká.hí*. (Voice is blurred, not sure of transcription, especially first allophone.) That's his name. "Walk."

(There's a picture of his camp at Mt. Scott and there's one of those bundles in it--did you ever notice that? It's hanging on a pole outside the tipi.)

Howard: Might be dried meat!

Ray: But they usually put them outside.
