I could think of it, but right now I can't think of it. I could just say that I know Louise said it - and Connie May said it - I know that word just as plain,
I can't think of it.

(Was he Kiowa-Apache?)

He was...I think he come from the Southwest. See, those Mescaleros and Jicarillas, and the ones they referred to as the c'é é d e n a, that's Barefoot Indians. I guess they ain't got no shoes. They stay out there where it's hot. They don't wear shoes. Apaches call 'em ce e dena, which means "no shoes." They were a band of them that used peyote. No doubt but what they had a history. And then in addition to that, we have a history. I think - I showed what my father wrote that, and there's 3 or 4 stories connected with the origin of the peyote. But Apaches were the first to use Peyote here, then the Commanches, then the Kiowas. And now they all claim originals - like Caddoes and Osages, Ponca, Pawnee - all those tribes.

(Did you ever hear which group Ben's father came from?)

Yeah, I heard, but I don't know what it is in English. They call it da tahe. That's Mescalero. We refer to them as da tahe. That's Mescalero. Now that word, Mescalero is semething else. I don't know. Maybe you, you know what that word is.

(No, I don't.)

It's English. Spelled. I imagine it's Mexican word.

(What Mescalero?)

Sounds like a Mexican word to me.

(Oh, I know where that term Mescalero comes from, I thought you meant this da tah?.

(Interruption)

(Do you remember what Apache Ben's mother's name was?)
