(Before Mooney came, how many calendars were there?)

Well, this original, and Poolaw's calendar came in early and--Captain Nye wrote a story about Setshun's calendar. I never heard of it till I read the book. But-- Set-sun (or Set-shun) calendar of this original-- Colonel Nye wrote a book about that calendar, mixed up in these other ones, but some of Captain Nye's informants told him that Set'au (sét'au.) didn't have sense enough to write a calendar of his own, so he must have copied from the original. In order to try and get the money from those that were buying those Indian souvenirs. Because they don't think that he made that himself. They're doubting him! (Laughs)

(Well, this one right here--that's pictured right here--who kept this one?)

Well, this picture was taken from the original. It was taken from the original and then those other copies made in those books--from these. This was on skin. See? That's the way it is? (indicating picture in Mooney) The original was on a skin. But after years, it got old and copies were made in those other--
