And they'd have this cedar with red berries on it. They dry that and then they get the leaves and crumble them. And then that goes with it. When they put that in the fire and made their smoke, it has a very peculiar odor. Some kind of perfume-like odor.

(Well, did you use that cedar when you went for a medicine man?)

Well, they used that in the ceremony. You just give it (the cedar) to them. They use it themselves. They use that in the peyote worship too. Same tobacco in peyote worship. And they use cedar. We can give you a peyote story, I guess, that would be interesting.

(Ok, yeah. Well, did they use this cedar when those buffalo medicine men doctored?)

Yeah, they used this cedar.

(How did they use it?)

They put it in a skillet and they have coals in there, and the medicine men throws it in there and it makes smoke. And they put the feathers and buffalo tails over there (in the smoke) and they have otter fluid or something that's mixed up with it and it makes a peculiar odor. "Otter oil", we call it.
