And her mother gave me a horse. Yeah, she was still living when I gave it.

(Did you tell her?)

No! I couldn't be brave to tell her. I just gave it to her. But she had it on in her casket.

(Did you show it to her?)

No. She was already dead.

(Did your husband ever tell you what he had to pay for that dress back then?)

Oh, it's way up there (expensive). They've been expensive all the way through.

(Were there any Arapaho women that used to make buckskin dresses?)
Oh yeah, there's a lot of them that used to make them. But
they're all dead.

(Did the women used to wear beaded leggings?)
Yeah.

(Did you ever make any of those?)

No. I made a pair of leggings, but I made them for my foster mother. That's what she had on when she passed away. Yeah, they were beaded.

(Did you have leggings yourself?)

Yeah, I had leggings.

(Did someone make them for you or did you buy them?)

Somebody made them for me.

(When you were married and your children were little and you were making a lot of moccasins--where did you get your beads?)

I bought them.

(Did they sell them at all the stores?)

They used to have a store here--Indian Trader store at Darling-ton--where we used to buy our beads. Then they keep some at El Reno by that--where that tipi is. They got beads in there. Yeah, they have them yet.

(Did you ever make any moccasins or other things to sell--to earn money?)

No. Just what they order for me to make, I used to make it. (Did you get paid when they would order something?)

Yes. They couldn't order them without paying! That's a silly
