Third voice: Didn't learn how to speak it.

He used to interpret for the courts - District Court and the U.S. Court.

(Confusion and static) ... children used to come there and what I learned I got from them.

(Well. And you would learn a lot that way too, being you associate with 'em.) I know old Rondi Grass come there one time. He wanted stuff and I was doin' pretty well gettin' this stuff together for 'im and he come in and - let's see "dequill" (?) and I didn't know what it was. (laughter) (I don't think I ever heard that either.)
