There has been different denominations but it's same Sunday School and same people.

It's out there at Rose but I think it's Presbyterian now. It was Baptist awhile.

Yes. That's the same Sunday School. They tell me it has never missed a Sunday since that particular Sunday. But anyhow, Mrs. Hattie Johnson (words not clear) she came down from Missouri and she went to church in Vinita. My mother had written a letter up there and the preacher announced that the church up there and the preacher announced that--she told me that last week. I saw her and I didn't know her. She's gettin' up pretty close to 100 years old now and still livin' and her mind is clear as a bell. And I visited with her and she lives at Pryor.
