He used it with bee's wax down at the store, you know, and he would help her raise her tobacco to smoke, but he would get out once in a while and he'd try to chew that tobacco and it would make him sick as a horse. But it was just too strong to even try to use in chewing. But I don't remember anybody--about all they wanted it for was just for smoking. And it was strong when you could smell it.

(Well did they have commercial tobacco in the stores in those days too?)

Yeah. They had it and as far as I can remember they had tobacco, in the stores, that you could buy.
