We paid \$80.00 for mine.

(Is that the cover and the poles and everything?)

No, just the cover. We had to pay extra for the painting we got done on ours. Roland Whitehorse painted it the way my father had his. Real good paint on it. Got story on it printed.

(Why did you say Mary Poafpybitty was mad at May Walqua?)

Because she went up there and told them she was Princess and that she was chiefs granddaughter, and I don't know what all. (She went to organizers of the 1967 Medicine Lodge Treaty celebration). One of her folks was chief who was captured. Captured from the Mexicans.

(Is she with that southern bunch of Comanches?)

Yeah. She's from Cache.

(Did you say that some of Mary's relatives were chiefs?)

Yeah, her sister was married into that chief bunch at Cache. They got
