(I was always curious about why all those Comanche names have "bitty" in them? Saubitty, Poafpybitty, Chibitty. Do you ever hear where--what that "bitty" part means?)

No. I just now notice it.

(Will you make a speech at Medicine Lodge?)

No.

(Who says who, will be there? Will you be on the program because of your relation to Stumbling Bear?)

Yeah. Oh, we give a program, me and Scott (her son) and one of my cousins lives at Wichita, Kansas, he come down there, Francie Stumbling Bear, he got that name on account of my uncle. My uncle tells them a lot of stories. He had a medicine horse, you know that takes him on the warpath. He'd always put feather on him. Something came to him in a dream when he was on the warpath so that's why he dress that horse when he's going on warpath. My grandpa, put a feather on there, when he's going on warpath and he always be the first one to get there of all the Indians at war. And all the people know him by that. They called him Strawberry Roah, and he be the first one to get there and scalp and kill other tribe. That's how come he became chief. On Veteran's Day they going to have a real Blacklegging Indian Dance for War Dance. The eleventh is the main day. They going to feed everybody. I think they got buffalo bargeque and beef. We had meat in here the other night. We put the tent up and they sing songs. We always camp. My boy took pictures. He part white and part Comanche. His name was Danny. While I was camping at Indian City he took the picture. Lot of people take it from the back of the tipi, you know, but you ain't supposed to mingle too much around the back, you could stand away and take
